

BTLS/ITLS Past, Present and Future **John Campbell, MD, FACEP**

This lecture will present the history of the Basic Trauma Life Support organization and how the BTLS/ITLS course came about. It will also review how a simple “How To” course spread all over the world and gave birth to an international organization of teachers of trauma care. The current educational programs and plans for the future will also be discussed. This is the perfect session to kick off the 20th Annual ITLS Ohio Emergency Care Conference!

Pediatric SICK/NOT SICK! A Guide to Rapid Pediatric Patient Assessment **Mike Helbock, NREMT-P, MICP**

Rapid assessment and appropriate treatment of the “Sick” pediatric patient can mean the difference between a child that survives and one who does not. Pediatric assessment doesn’t need to be intimidating. Learn from the author of the famed “Sick/Not Sick” program on how to use a “triad” of key indicators to quickly assess and decide the correct treatment path. By using the “triangle”, pediatric assessment has never been easier!

From the Depths of Hell: The Innovation and Odyssey to Save 33 Chilean Miners **JD Polk, DO, MS, MMM, CPE, FACOEP**

NASA was consulted and involved in the rescue of the 33 Chilean miners. In this session, Dr. Polk, former Chief, Space Medicine, NASA Johnson Space Center will go over the many facets of physiology and emergency and disaster medicine that were considered and used to affect one of the most audacious rescues in history. The session will review the implications for blast over pressure on the human body, the diagnosis, treatment and prevention of refeeding syndrome, the implications of orthostatic hypotension and the nuances and implications of rescue and cage design.

PRE-CONFERENCE WORKSHOPS

Thursday, February 23, 2012

Advanced Field Airway Management Workshop

0800-1700 – General – 8 CEs

The approach to field airway management has undergone a major shift in recent years – are you up-to-date on the latest procedures? Incorporating current research and tools, this workshop teaches responders to recognize and manage the difficult adult and pediatric airways in the field setting. Students will be provided a hands-on opportunity to master additional airway management skills, so that they can apply them to their practice and teach their colleagues upon their return from the conference. This workshop is an expansion of the 2011 workshop.

At the conclusion of the class, the participant will be able to:

- 1) Describe and perform the steps involved in a medication assisted intubation
- 2) Identify factors that contribute to a difficult airway in the field situation
- 3) Manage an airway using a blind insertion airway device
- 4) Describe the indications and steps for performing a surgical airway
- 5) Perform an organized assessment of the trauma airway in the field setting in both adult and pediatric patients

This workshop is limited to 60 registrants.

Requirements: This workshop is intended for advanced level providers. EMT-B and First Responders are not permitted to register for the workshop. Although EMT-I's are permitted to register, they may not be able to perform all of the workshop skills under the scope of practice.

Special Children's Outreach and Prehospital Education (SCOPE)

0800-1700 – Pediatric – 8 CEs

This workshop is designed to teach all prehospital providers how to care for children with special health care needs. These children often have uncommon medical conditions that are unfamiliar to prehospital care providers. SCOPE is designed to improve their knowledge and comfort level when encountering children with special health care needs. It provides basic information on various chronic medical conditions that these children may have, as well as the technologies and equipment that may be necessary for their survival.

The course is divided into three sections:

- 1) Chronic Conditions - focusing on medical conditions that are common in children with special health care needs.
- 2) Special Technologies - describing medical equipment that prehospital providers may come in contact with when providing care for this population.
- 3) Advanced Practitioners - highlighting the special procedures that the prehospital providers may have to perform.

This course is limited to 30 registrants. Registrants will be e-mailed a pre-test.

Instructor Workshop: Combining Entertainment with Education to Keep Them Coming Back

Evolution of EMS Field Treatments: A 30 Year Perspective

This session will review the last three decades of devices, procedures and treatments that have come and gone in the evolution of modern EMS.

Flight Medicine: A Graphic View From Above and Below in HEMS Utilization

With HEMS becoming more controversial this presentation looks at both sides of HEMS utilization. We will discuss the common reasons for helicopter utilization and what the statistics show us about outcomes. There may be some unexpected information in this presentation!

OB/Gyn Emergencies...A Field Approach

This happens more than we would like...you find the patient crowning or has a presenting limb on your arrival...NOW WHAT? This session will walk you through the various complication of emergency childbirth in a video-based format and we will identify those that can (and those that can't) deliver in the field. Attendance in this class will help you to be successful on that very next call!

Let's Give That Cowboy a Big Hand...Rodeo Stock Injuries

Rodeo is an American icon. There are approximately 2,000 sanctioned rodeos throughout North America each year ranging from small towns such as Luna, New Mexico and Alpine, Arizona to the big cities of New York, Dallas and Las Vegas. EMS providers are responsible for patient care at many of these events. Rodeo athletes, particularly rough stock riders, suffer numerous injuries during their competitions ranging from minor strains and sprains to life threatening head, chest, and abdominal trauma. Using photographs, x-rays, CTs and video, this presentation reviews 3 case studies involving rodeo rough stock injuries in which the prehospital care had a significant effect on patient morbidity and mortality.

Breakout Sessions

Home Improvement Trauma

When it comes to America's most dangerous job, construction related injuries are ranked among the top five - 70% of which are weekend warrior types. Who needs a building permit, safety attire, or instructional guides when all you really need is a can of cold beer in one hand and a power tool in the other? This session will examine some of the most common and uncommon injuries of those chaotic moments when a man fails to stay focused on the task at hand while either remodeling his homestead or reshaping the landscape. Clinical

assessment and care along with scene safety will be addressed and though there are some graphic moments, Steve will keep in balanced with humor in one hand and a power tool power point remote in the other.

Pediatric Airway and Respiratory Emergencies

This breakout session will familiarize attendees with the differences between the pediatric and adult airway. It will also identify common and life-threatening pediatric airway/respiratory emergencies. Finally, it will discuss the management of pediatric airway/respiratory emergencies.

Update on Ohio Drug Laws for Emergency Medical Services

This presentation will review the drug laws of Ohio and how they impact EMS operation including licensing, drug addendums and protocols, drug security, record keeping and drug acquisition.

The U.S. Emergency Services and Homeland Security Mission to Israel: Sharing Between Nations

The American Israel Education Foundation U.S. Emergency Services and Homeland Security Mission to Israel provided a unique opportunity for a small group of American leaders in emergency response, including Dr. Carol Cunningham, to explore critical foreign policy and national security issues. The program fostered discussions with Israeli first responders, military officers, government officials, experts on terrorism, and journalists on various aspects of threats, defense technologies, and mass casualty incident triage, emergency response, and in the prehospital and hospital settings. The mission included tours of trauma centers, the front lines of conflict, and the key regions of the Golan Heights and Sderot. The pearls of wisdom gained from the mission will hopefully enable our emergency care system to enhance the preparedness of our civilians and maximize the resiliency of the communities that we serve.

Bullets, Bombs and Other Things That Go Bump in the Night

During the presentation, we will be looking at patterns of injury and penetrating wound formation due to projectiles and explosives. We

will be using recorded videos that depict real life scenarios, to gain a greater understanding of the injuries sustained during a shooting or bombing, and predict injuries based on weapon type and range.

Infancy: Mystery, Malady and Milestones

What's next, after the initial resuscitation for a just delivered baby? This session focuses on caring for our youngest patients - starting with the newly born, then the neonate's first month and tracking through the infant's dynamic first year. Discussion highlights include perinatal risks, growth & development, sudden infant death, common illnesses, as well as tidbits on latest oxygen and hypothermia research.

I've Got a Crush on You

This session will discuss crush Injury, the pathophysiology of the injury and its complications. It will also cover prehospital signs and symptoms and treatment through the initial and ongoing treatment and considerations.

Adult Abuse, Neglect & Exploitation

In the headlines every day across the country are stories of adult abuse, neglect or exploitation. We think it will never happen to us, our family members, our patients or in our community, but it does and we are not aware of it. During this interactive presentation you will become aware of the many forms of aduse, some subtle, some obvious, the neglect that is prevalent in your community and the exploitation of adults through various methods. You will leave this presentation with the knowledge of what actually occurs everywhere, but also with the tools to report your findings and ways to prevent it from happening to you.

Sunday Breakout Sessions

Bomb Threats and Suspicious Packages

The bomb threat is one such challenge. The bomber has a distinct advantage over other criminals because he can pick his time and place from afar, and use the bomb threat as a weapon to achieve his criminal objectives. This presentation has been prepared in order to provide private and public safety agencies with a working base from which to establish their own bomb threat response capability; and to enable these same agencies, when called upon by potential bomb or bomb threat targets in the business community, to offer assistance in developing guidelines for a bomb threat response plan.

Current Ebb & Flow of Submersion Events

Submersion injuries comprise a broad continuum which often results in devastating neurologic injury despite best efforts. While prevention makes the only definitive impact and event factors may “seal the fate” of bad outcome, initial scene management and rapid transfer to specialized center improves chance for optimal outcome. This session will update attendees with drowning definitions, statistics, prognostic indicators and current therapeutic modalities.

Entering the Fall of Existence: Geriatrics - Not Just “Old” Adults

Seasons have come to represent the pathway of our lives with much written and said about our “spring” and “summer”. This lecture reflects and demystifies the lives and emergency treatment for those we meet in their “fall” and “winter”. Geriatrics, so often defined and approached as the end-stage to one or many disease process, is so much more - especially given today’s more active, mobile and energetic population.

Quality EMS: It Isn’t the Holy Grail

Quality EMS is a standard that each provider has a chance to contribute to. Come to this class and learn about a “grassroots” approach to first class medicine. Upon completion of the session attendees should be able to list four components of a typical EMS system and compare the philosophy of “QA” vs. “CQI”.
