An estimated 240 million calls are made to 9-1-1 in the U.S. each year. There are approximately 1 million emergency runs for EMS in the state each year.

Few appreciate the importance of EMS service in their community until an emergency calls upon firefighters and EMTs to respond to a life-threatening situation. It is only then that many truly value the skills and training of these professionals and understand their relevant role within one's neighborhood.

Nationwide, EMS teams are ready to provide critical, lifesaving care to those in need 24 hours a day, seven days a week, with many of our first responders being volunteers.

Every day, here in Ohio, there are outstanding accounts of first responders fearlessly entering emergency situations, quickly assessing and deciding what needs to be done to save a mother, a father, or a child.

Currently, Ohio has the commitment and dedication of 40,000 EMTs and more than 50,000 firefighters in Ohio who provide a fundamental community service every day. It's great to know that we are being served by a group who our dedicated to providing the highest level of care.
