Human Trafficking - The Stats, The Trends and The Law Enforcement Response

(Webinar): Presenters for this webinar will frame the issue of human trafficking by discussing the trends being seen by experts in the 42 federally funded Anti-Human Trafficking Task forces. The presenters will provide both a national and local perspective on how the human trafficking epidemic is affecting law enforcement and communities around the nation.

The two presenters for this webinar are Dr. Jack McDevitt, Associate Dean for Research and Graduate Studies at the College of Criminal Justice at Northeastern University and Lt. Derek Marsh of both the Westminster California Police Department and the Orange County Human Trafficking Task Force (OCHTTF).

Dr. Jack McDevitt directs the Institute on Race and Justice and the Center for Criminal Justice Policy Research at Northeastern University and has co-authored a number of reports on human trafficking including a monograph for the US Department of Justice on local law enforcement experiences with cases of human trafficking. Presently he is working with Dr. Amy Farrell to develop the first national data collection system for human trafficking investigations and is working on a project to identify barriers to identification and prosecution of human trafficking cases. Dr. McDevitt has spoken numerous times on human trafficking both nationally and internationally and has testified as an expert witness before the Judiciary Committees of both US Senate and The US House of Representatives and as an invited expert at the White House.

Teen Seat Belt Use Initiative:

DESCRIPTION: National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT)

ACTION: Announcement of a Request for Application for the effort entitled DDACTS - Teen Seat Belt use Initiative. Competition under this RFA is restricted to competition among the State Highway Safety Offices (SHSO) (including the District of Columbia) and law enforcement agencies only. It is anticipated that two awards will be made under this agreement (not to exceed \$500,000 total). **SUMMARY:** The purpose of this cooperative agreement is to assist States or local law enforcement agencies interested in utilizing DDACTS to enhance their law enforcement activities as

it applies to teen seat belt use and teen crime.

DATES: Application(s) must be submitted to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, Office of Acquisition Management (NPO-320); Attention: Ms. Sheresse Gray, 1200 New Jersey Avenue, S.E., W51-121, Washington, D.C. 20590. All application(s) submitted must include a reference to NHTSA Request for Application Number DTNH22-11-R-00492. Only complete packages received on or before 2:00 P.M. Eastern Standard Time on Thursday, June 30, 2011 will be considered.

FUNDING: \$250,000 - \$500,000

CLOSING DATE FOR APPLICATIONS: June 30, 2011
